





Dear Friends and Neighbors,

The delivery of health care has changed dramatically over the past few years. The Taylor Regional Hospital Annual Report gives us an opportunity to share what has been happening over the last year at our hospital.

This year saw many changes. A new general surgeon, Dr. James (Jamie) Bergin joined Taylor Regional Surgical Associates at the end of 2015. The practice of Internal Medicine Associates also joined the hospital as an owned practice in July, 2015. Dr. Joel Eade, Dr. David Montgomery, Dr. Thomas Rogers, Dr. Steve Hinton, Tammy Lamb-Harris APRN, and Sean Maynard PA-C provide services in that practice. Dr. David Montgomery and Dr. Thomas Rogers also provide Hospitalist services for TRH. We also added additional providers in the outpatient setting, Jackie Brendel, APRN, and Kay Vespie, APRN. Angela Lang, APRN, has transitioned to a primary care office setting rather than the walk-in clinic, and takes appointments. She is located in the space where Dr. Bobby Brooks practice was previously.

An outpatient pharmacy was opened for our employees and patients in June, 2015. It enables patients to fill their prescriptions before they leave to go home. In 2016 we hope to expand the service even further into our Emergency Room. Also in June our Nuclear Medicine Department became accredited by the American College of Radiology.

A big accomplishment in September of last year was the re-accreditation of the hospital by The Joint Commission. We were recognized for the many accomplishments we had made in enhancing patient care.

A new 64 Slice Siemens CT scanner was installed in our Radiology department. It allows us to offer more services, in a shorter period of time, with a decrease in radiation exposure. We are in the process of developing a Rehab/Orthopedic office that will offer aqua therapy in a building located across the street from the hospital in the medical office park. Groundbreaking is set for April 1, 2016.

We also partnered with Campbellsville University to provide sports physicals for their athletes and our Orthopedic Surgeons attended all of their home football games. Going forward we are looking for other ways to enhance our relationship with CU. We worked with both Campbellsville and Taylor County School students to offer shadowing opportunities for those interested in going into the medical field.

Like a Main Street and the Independence Day parade, our hospital is a vital part of the community. We are a source of jobs and hometown pride in addition to healthcare services. That is why we are committed to protecting and preserving our community based hospital. What a comfort and assurance to know that your community hospital is there when you need them-a promise you can count on 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year. For over 41 years, Taylor Regional Hospital has been entrusted with healthcare in our community and we are proud to be able to provide that service.

Health Fair

Nearly 1,000 individuals and 50 vendors attended Taylor Regional Hospital's annual community health fair in June at Taylor County Elementary School. Services included a complete blood count, comprehensive metabolic profile, thyroid stimulating hormone screening, coronary risk profile with cholesterol levels and prostate-specific antigen screening. Lab tests were performed on 642 people and 214 were screened for prostate cancer. The University of Kentucky Gill Heart Institute performed free carotid artery screenings.

Lindsey Wilson College Training Site

The Taylor Regional Hospital/American Heart Association Training Center is celebrating a new partnership with Lindsey Wilson College who will join Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital and Russell County Hospital as the third Training Site in partnership with Taylor Regional Hospital. The Lindsey Wilson Training Site will be coordinated by Tamara Eastham RN (past winner of the AHA Instructor of the Year at the Taylor Regional Hospital Training Center).

The Taylor Regional Hospital American Heart Training Center, coordinated by Richard Phillips, along with our Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital Site and the Russell County Hospital Training Site currently oversees 87 instructors that are certified with 191 disciplines which last year facilitated 762 American Heart CPR classes that led to over 3,147 students gaining life saving skills that they can take back to their communities, which is a new record for trained students in a year and reflects a 3.6% increase from 2013 record setting total.

Baby Fair

The Annual Baby Fair in April featured 21 vendors and speakers, including Jenny Dobson, director of the Taylor Regional Hospital Women's Center. Certified professionals from Kentucky Department of Transportation also performed car seat safety checks. More than 60 expecting parents toured the Women's Center and received giveaways.

Hip Screenings

Dr. Galen Weiss, a Board Certified Orthopedic Surgeon at Taylor Regional Orthopedic Group, offered the community free hip screenings in February.

Parkinson's Disease Education

Dr. Jill Blandford, Taylor Regional Neurology, presented a free educational program on Parkinson's disease. The March program at the Taylor County Cooperative Extension Service reached 35 individuals and a second program was offered in April at the hospital.

Golf Scramble

For the seventh year, the charity golf scramble was a success with 19 teams participating. The event in September raised approximately \$30,000 to support Taylor Regional Hospital Transportation Service that provides no-cost transportation to qualifying patients to the hospital, rehabilitation services, physician offices and Cancer Center.

Transportation Service Recognized in National Publication

The American Hospital Association featured Taylor Regional Hospital Transportation Service in a national publication. "Community Connections: Ideas and Innovations for Hospital Leaders", a publication distributed to every hospital Chief Executive Officer nationwide, highlights hospitals that are addressing the communities' socioeconomic factors, health behaviors, access to care and physical environment barriers to improve the health of those they serve.

Taylor Regional Hospital offers free transportation services to qualifying individuals who need a ride to treatment, testing or appointments at the hospital, rehabilitation services, Cancer Center and other affiliated services, including appointments with physicians in our community. In 2015, the vans traveled more than 84,300 miles.

Pulmonary Embolism

Taylor Regional Hospital Laboratory did an evaluation of the diagnostic accuracy of two D-Dimer assays in pulmonary embolism. The results of the evaluation were presented at the International Society on Thrombosis and Hemostasis (ISTH) in Toronto, Canada on June 20-25, 2015.

Remote Presence Robotics

Taylor Regional Hospital has acquired Remote Presence Robotics, the latest in stroke technology. This means patients with stroke symptoms who arrive at TRH can be assessed almost instantaneously by neurologists specializing in stroke. As a result, emergency physicians can more quickly treat stroke patients in their ER, and reduce or eliminate long-term stroke impacts on their patients. The physicians will work directly with the University of Louisville Stroke Team.

Similar to a more interactive Skype, this robot, called the RP Lite Robot Unit, can turn its head to better view the patient and zoom in, allowing the physician on the other end to get so close they can check a patient's pupils or other vital signs. While controlling what the robot does on the other side, the doctor can also read scans and talk to the patient and emergency room staff. The robot can be wheeled to any patient room so that the consulting neurologist can treat patients anywhere in the hospital.

InTouch Health provides technology-enabled services to healthcare organizations for the delivery of high quality virtual care, anytime, anywhere. The InTouch Telehealth Network provides users unmatched ease of use and diagnostic capabilities, proven reliability, FDA and HIPAA compliance, secure access control, and clinical and technical reporting.



Taylor Regional Internal Medicine

The Internal Medicine Associates, including Drs. Joel Eade, Stephen Hinton, David Montgomery and Tom Rogers with Tammy Lamb, APRN and Sean Maynard PA-C, have joined Taylor Regional Hospital Medical Group. Dr. Montgomery and Dr. Rogers have also joined the Hospitalist program. All physicians continue to also see patients in their offices.

Outpatient Pharmacy

Taylor Regional Hospital Outpatient Pharmacy opened in July to provide patients needed prescriptions before they leave from an inpatient stay, outpatient surgery or emergency room visit. The on-site pharmacy offers delivery to patient rooms, competitive pricing, convenient prescription pickup, low over-the-counter medication prices, personalized patient education and medication reviews.

Taylor Regional Hospital Earns ACR Accreditation

Taylor Regional Hospital was awarded a three-year term of accreditation in nuclear medicine following a review by the American College of Radiology (ACR). Nuclear medicine is a branch of medical imaging that uses small amounts of radioactive material, injected through an IV, to diagnose and treat a variety of diseases, including many types of cancer, heart disease and certain other abnormalities within the body.

The ACR gold seal of accreditation represents the highest level of image quality and patient safety. Image quality, personnel qualifications, adequacy of facility equipment, quality control procedures and quality assurance programs are assessed.

Education and Training Grant

Taylor Regional Hospital received a \$50,000 grant from the Kentucky Cabinet for Economic Development's Bluegrass State Skills Corporation. The grant reimburses the hospital for training eligible hospital employees to ensure staff is equipped with the most current medical knowledge available to treat and serve the region.

New CT Scanner

Taylor Regional Hospital is pleased to announce we have expanded our diagnostic imaging with the recent \$1.3 Million purchase and installation of the new Siemens SOMATOM® Definition AS CT scanner. The state-of-theart SAFIRE image reconstruction software allows for up to 60% dose reduction across a wide portfolio of clinical applications. Exceptional clinical benefits include high image quality even for patients who are obese, short of breath, or have elevated heart rates. The automated technology helps allow the technologist to spend less time at the machine and more time with the patient.

New Rehabilitation Facility

The Rehabilitation Department, Orthopedic Physician Practice, Facilities Department, and Design Team are reviewing current clinic operations and developing the program plan for the new facility. Construction Documents are underway and the expectation is that the facility will be approximately 15,375 square feet. The building design will incorporate standards of rehabilitation practice and methods, along with space for an Orthopedic Physician Practice, yet the flexibility to accommodate changing utilization patterns. The design will also optimize the patient experience while creating efficiencies for care givers. The facility will include an aguatic therapy pool and all of the required infrastructure. TRH Rehab Services received the 2015 Central Kentucky News-Journal Reader's Choice Award for Best Physical Therapy in Taylor County/Campbellsville.


