Taylor Regional Hospital Receives Quality Award From KHA

Taylor Regional Hospital was awarded the Kentucky Hospital Association's (KHA) Annual Quality Award, the KHA's highest quality honor, on May 14, 2007, at the KHA Award's Gala in Louisville. Taylor Regional Hospital was one of 14 applicants for four awards.

Taylor Regional Hospital was honored for its work in the area of preventing healthcare associated infections. As a participant in the Institute of Healthcare Improvement 100K Lives Campaign, TRH successfully implemented the "Central Line Bundle" which consists of five evidenced based components that have been shown to decrease the rate of central line associated bloodstream infections. The quality improvement project resulted in greater than a 75% decrease in central line infections throughout the hospital in 2006.

Other hospitals receiving the 2006 KHA Annual Quality Award Include Our Lady of the Way Hospital, Martin; The VA Medical Center, Lexington; and Central Baptist Hospital, Lexington.

Programs apply for Recognition voluntarily. Programs that achieve Recognition status have a staff of knowledgeable health professionals who can provide participants with comprehensive information about diabetes management. Education Recognition status is verified by an official certificate from ADA and awarded for three years.

According to the American Diabetes Association, there are 20.8 million people or 7% of the population of the United States who have diabetes. While an estimated 14.6 million have been diagnosed,

unfortunately, 6.2 million people are not aware that they have this disease. Each day approximately 4,110 people are diagnosed with diabetes.

Taylor Regional Hospital Offering Transportation to those in Need

Taylor Regional Hospital is now offering van transportation to eligible patients in the community who are coming to TRH for medical services, according to hospital CEO, Jane Wheatley. "Through the generosity of our community, we were able to raise funds to support this new service at our Gala in 2006. We received the van through a grant from the Lake Cumberland ADD District and we will now be able to fund a driver along with transportation expenses," says Ms. Wheatley.

Eligibility for these services will be determined when the patient is being scheduled for the test or treatment at their physician's office. Medicaid patients will not be eligible for this service as they are assisted through other agencies. This van is not wheelchair accessible, therefore all patients must be completely ambulatory. "There are many patients who receive weekly medical treatments that have difficulty finding transportation," says Cindy Rose, Director of Public Relations & Hospitality Services. "In addition to transporting patients to the hospital for testing, we will also be transporting patients to Rehab Services and the Cancer Center. We think that we are meeting a community need. This service is available in Taylor, Green and Adair Counties. TRH is continuing to seek grant funding for a fully handicap accessible van. Call (270) 789-5814 for more information.





Taylor Regional Hospital Announces Acquisition of Cutting Edge Diagnostic Imaging System



Taylor Regional Hospital will make available the latest, most advanced whole-body imaging technology with positron emission tomography/computed tomography (PET/CT), significantly enhancing their diagnostic services offered. PET/CT is an invaluable clinical test for cancer, heart disease and neurological disorders.

"Unlike other types of diagnostic imaging systems, PET/CT allows us to look at minute chemical and physiological changes related to metabolism," according to Jane Wheatley, CEO. "Whereas other imaging methods provide mainly structural information, PET/CT lets us see how the body is functioning. When the PET images and the CT images are fused together, the clinician's accuracy improves vastly. Adding PET/CT technology will provide distinct clinical advantages to our current imaging services."

PET/CT is a molecular imaging procedure that generates pictures of the precise location and extent of disease. By imaging the molecular, biological and functional basis for disease, PET/CT enables a physician to detect abnormal cell growth and activity. This information aids in the early detection and improved treatment of many diseases, allowing enhanced capabilities in pre-surgical staging, elimination of invasive procedures, enhanced therapy monitoring capabilities, and a reduction in the number of diagnostic tests performed. The fusing of PET and CT images into one image set allows clinicians to view the metabolism of cells in conjunction with the anatomical detail of computed tomography. The combination of the two modalities makes PET/CT a more powerful and accurate tool than a normal PET scanner. PET/CT's ability to diagnose cancer in extremely specific locations is unprecedented.

In oncology, PET/CT is the only modality that can accurately image many organs at one time to diagnose malignancy, even provide information about whether or not cancer has spread to other parts of the body. In addition to cancer studies, PET/CT examines patients for myocardial infarctions and looks for reversible damage as opposed to permanent heart damage. PET/CT is also used in neurological studies, investigating brain metabolism in patients with dementia and epilepsy.

"Adding PET/CT technology helps us achieve the goals of our

clinical and administrative team, through providing the highest level of care for our patients and their families," stated Ms. Wheatley. "This service will positively impact many lives throughout our community."

For the patient, PET/CT is a safe and painless procedure, which typically takes about one hour to complete. The system, provided on a mobile shared-user basis by Alliance Imaging, Inc., will preliminarily be available at the James Graham Brown Cancer Center at Taylor Regional Hospital and may expand as patient volume increases.
